Comments from Pastor Chris . . .

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,
Grace, mercy, and peace be to you from God our Father and from our Lord and Savior, Jesus the Christ. Amen.

The last two Sundays of November are significant. Nov. 22 marks the last Sunday of the Church year, which is Christ the King Sunday. Nov. 29 begins the new Church year, which is the first Sunday in Advent.

Christ the King Sunday focuses on the rule of Christ over all things. It was begun as a Roman Catholic holiday in 1925 by Pope Pius XI. At this period in history, European nations were being taken over by fascists, national socialists, and communists. Against these nationalistic and secularizing forces, Pope Pius XI wished for a Church festival to underscore that the true king of Christians, and indeed the whole world, is Christ the Lord. The festival was moved to its current position at the end of the liturgical (church) calendar in 1970, at which time Lutherans and other Protestants began celebrating it.

The new Church year begins with the first Sunday in Advent. The reason for this is simple. Advent has a twofold focus. The first is on the incarnation of Christ into concrete, human history, the second is as a time to remind us of the return of Christ at the end of all things, that is, at his second coming. As such, it seems like a fitting thing to begin the liturgical year both recalling how our Lord became a man to suffer and die for the sins of the world, and to recall his promise to come again. Indeed, the Bible often talks of the return of our Lord being immanent, and we would be wise to believe the sacred Writ when it speaks thus of Christ. After all, our Lord has promised to come "as a thief in the night" (1 Thessalonians 5:2), that is, to come when we do not expect him to.

We live in an odd time and a strange culture, one that advises us to put off the weighty, important things of God until the last possible moment. Coming to celebrate the Lord's day with those who believe in him is seen as superficial. Coming to Sunday services to receive the forgiveness won by Christ through Word and Sacrament are held off until late in life, if they are ever entered into at all. Would it not be prudent and wise to regularly commune? To regularly be absolved of your sins? To praise the Lord with song and voice? To enjoy the foretaste of the life to come? Be not of the mind of this age, instead, come to receive what Christ wants you to have. Amen.

Dear Family and Friends,

This month I would like to consider the area of family health and specifically focus on Family Communication. We can all recognize the big difference between being talked at and being understood. Communication means to “bring near” and is similar to words we often use such as community, common and communion.

Basic communication requires at least willing hearts, time someone to listen and someone to share idea, feelings or information. Today we communicate face to face as well as through email, twitter, voice mail, videos and in writing, listening carefully to everyone’s view is essential; “By wisdom a house is built and through understanding it is established” (Prov.24:3-4)

Effective listeners are able to: **Fully** attend to the speaker. **Consider** what is said, how it is said, both verbally and non-verbally (80% of communication is shared non-verbally) (Pr. 1:5) **Clarify** what was shared so you can fully understand what the speaker means. Asking open ended follow up questions and providing non-judgmental feedback can be very helpful. (Is. 1:18). **Affirm** the speaker and the message. Let the speaker know you understand what was shared and offer a word of encouragement or support (I Thess. 5:11). **Avoid** approaches that demean the speaker and halt communication such as interrupting, telling them how they feel, changing the focus to the listener’s issues, and ridiculing and/or labeling (Pr. 21:23).

Effective speakers are able to: **Share** thoughts, ideas, and feelings (Pr.22:11), Use **direct communication**: talk with the person you have a concern with (Mt. 18:15-16), **Balance messages of concern with praise** and encouragement (Acts 20:2), **Accept feedback, Accept responsibility** for their own behavior and avoid blaming (Mt. 7:3), and **Separate the person from the behavior** (Heb. 8:12).

By using such approaches, **we do more** than solve problems; we **role model** healthy relationships and teach our children Godly ways to manage conflict!

May Christ fill your homes with His peace.
